This term we have enjoyed learning about the vet's surgery during Aistear. We took on the roles of the vet, the vet's assistant, the receptionist and the customers. We




learned how to examine and look after sick animal teddies and enjoyed helping them get better! We also built our own vet's surgery with lego, blocks and playdoh.


We'll get the opportunity to get back into school soon and to continue to have fun, grow our friendships, explore our creativity, build on our knowledge and to develop as members of society.

We also had a lesson in patience and determination. The children of showed great understanding and empathy, and we saw a fantastic domino run




1st Class Mr Moynihan

We have also been working on an art project over the past two weeks. We learned how to make stained glass windows. On the first week we make random patterns of paint and cut them in to shapes to stick onto our classroom window. We mixed PVA paint with paint and food colouring to make window cling paint. Although we liked the first try we





















wanted to make even better ones so practised a stained glass method where you draw on a black outline first and let it dry. You then fill in each "window" with coloured window paint and let it dry. When its dry you can peel it off and stick it to the window. We made these butterflies and they look great on our window. Check it out next time you are passing the school!








6th Class Mr Falvey
